CRACHETED IN KAUNI YARN



Cape (or poncho)

Here you get the recipe for an "old thing" - it goes all the way back to the time when the site here was by the name "retvrang.dk". It is from my early days as a crochet-designer. But nevertheless, it has been allowed to have a place on the page here. It is crocheted from Kauni yarn, which creates the color change

itself. The neck is crocheted in "rib" - and there is a link to how to crochet rib. This beautiful cape is crocheted with double-picot stitches. It is crocheted from 1 skein of kauni yarn (wool) and is a practical, beautiful, usable shoulder warmer in cold weather. If you crochet it from a different yarn, it can easily be used on a summer day with a top underneath as well.

It is relatively simple to crochet. Airy - and yet snug around the shoulder. It is more practical than a shawl - it does not need to be tied or held in place - it just sits there!

Material: 1 skein of Kauni yarn 150 grams (suitable for crochet hook no. 3) For the neck, I used a skein of BC Yarn "Move", which was a leftover I had from the dawn of time) Crochet hook no. 3,5

You do this:

Ch= chain stitch, sc = single crochet, dc = double crochet, sl = slip stich

The pattern is crocheted in double picot (dbP) - which is crocheted as follows: Crochet 4 ch and crochet 1 sc in the first of the 4 ch, again crochet 4 ch and 1 sc in the first of the 4 new ch. (Link for rib at the bottom)

Start at the neck above by casting on 120 ch and gather these into a ring with a sl. You can also make the neck narrower/wider, but the number of ch you cast on must be divisible by 4.

<u>1 rnd:</u> On the first round, crochet 120 dc around the ring. The first double crochet consists of 3 chain stitches after assembling the ring - and then crochet the round (119 stitches). Collect the lap with a sl when you get around.

2. rnd: Then crochet dbP as described above, start as follows: Crochet 3 ch and then a * dbP, skip 2 stitches, 1 dc in the back stitch link* - repeat from * to * around the round. End the round with a dbP and then a sl in the 3rd ch bow from the beginning.

3. rnd: 2 ch, bring the needle around behind the first ch, crochet 1 sl between the 2 P, 3 ch * 1 dbP, 1 sl st around the middle of the next dbP (between the 2 P)* - repeat from * to * to the end of the round and finish with a km in the 3rd ch from the beginning.

4 - 7 rnd - as the 3rd half

8. rnd: Increases must be made on this round - this is done as follows: as the 3rd round but increase 1 loop in every 5th loop (4 loops without a increase and a increase in the 5th loop). Removal takes place as follows: crochet 1 sl st, 1 sl st in the next loop, 1 sl st, 1 sl st in the same st.

9 - 12 rnd: as the 3rd rnd

13. rnd: take out as described in the 8th round in every 5 dbP

14 - 26 rnd: crochet without increases

Break the yarn and fasten the ends.

The neck crochet in "rib" with double crochets. The neck is crocheted straight up to the desired number of cm/length. The neck is crocheted over all 120 stitches with black yarn. It's hard for me to describe how to crochet rib, but I have a link to a youtube video that shows you how to do it. You crochet double crochets "in front" and "behind" each other. The neckline is now crocheted to the desired length. Break the yarn and staple the ends.

Your cape is finished - enjoy your work.

Note: The cape can be made both longer and shorter according to temperament. You can continue your laps and take out continuously to the desired length and width. Maybe it even reaches poncho length... But then you have to estimate how much extra yarn is needed.
