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FLORAL SCARF

All my free patterns is old - from the time, when my website was retvrang - and back then i was new in the www-world....
But anyways - i brought them with me to my new website Knitfreak.com. They are still free - but i must say - i have learned a lot since then. This pattern is free - I hope you like it, even though it is old. I decided to let this pattern live.

Floral scarf

This fine scarf both decorates and warms. And then you can get to work that before Christmas. Maybe you know someone who could use a scarf like that -

I would like to share the recipe with you, and if you want to see more, you can find recipe and instructions below.

or maybe you just want to treat yourself.



You will need:

About 100 grams of wool yarn or similar - suitable for crochet hook no. 3. The amount of yarn can vary, depending on how wide and long you want the scarf. A yarn suggestion could be "Drops - Flora". It could also be Class 1 stocking yarn from Mayflower - or something similar.

You do this:

The scarf here consists of 64 flowers which are sewn together. You can make the scarf wider or longer - according to taste and preference.

The scarf is sewn together with 3 flowers per row.

You crochet the flower as follows:

Crochet 7 chain stitches (ch) and join these with a slip stitch(sl st).

1 round: Crochet. 3 ch (which makes it next to the first treble crochet (dc). Then crochet 17 treble crochets down into the ring (around the ring). Collect the round with a slipstitch.

2nd round: Crochet 4 ch and then go down in the 3rd treble from the first round. Crochet a single crochet (sc) in the 3rd dc. - This is how you continue the round by making loops. Skip all the way to the 3rd stitch and secure the loop with a double crochet. You then have a total of 6 loops on the round, which consist of 4 ch.

3rd round: Now the leaves must be crocheted - you do it as follows: In each loop you crochet (around the loop) 1 dc, 1 half treble crochet (htr) 1 tr, 1 double-treble crochet

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(dtr), 1trc, 1 hdc, 1 sc. Then skip to the next loop and repeat the same stitches. When you reach the round, join with a chain stitch.

Break the yarn - fasten ends.

You can use the ends from the flowers to sew together, so just wait to staple.

When you have obtained a sufficient number of flowers, as desired, sew the flowers together with a few single stitches where they need to be stapled together. Sew a few stitches and staple the ends.

The sewing work is totally worth it, and you get a really nice result.
