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PONCHO CROCHETED FROM THE "MAYBELLE FLOWER"

Maybelle poncho

Poncho crocheted from squares
"maybelle flower". Squares are
crocheted, which are finally
crocheted together. You can
make the poncho from the yarn
quality you want - and in the size
you want. Beautiful pattern,



which can be combined in many different colors - taste and pleasure. I link to the recipe for the Maybelle flower. It has been translated into Swedish and also shown with a detailed picture description. Both the flower itself and the contrasting color around it are shown crocheting, so that it will form a square.

You will need:

I used the yarn "Move" from BC Garn. I have used 7 keys brown, 3 keys green, 2 keys red, 2 keys orange. The poncho can also be made in other yarn qualities - it just needs to fit crochet hook no.

3. You could use cotton yarn for a summer edition - or maybe an alpaca......or whatever you think.

Crochet hook no. 3

You do this:

A nice person has translated the pattern on the maybelle flower into Swedish - and you can find the pattern here:

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A total of 80 squares must be crocheted (40 for the front piece and 40 for the back piece), which are crocheted together at the end. Look at the picture how I put my squares together. The poncho is crocheted in 2 pieces - a front piece and a back piece, which are identical. These 2 pieces are put together before the neckline and bottom edge are crocheted.

The interlocking are with double crochets - and there are only crochets together in the back stitches on the squares. It is important that the crocheting takes place in long contexts - first on one link and then on the other link. So I suggest crocheting the front piece and the back piece together only when you have enough squares for the whole piece. I found instructions for crocheting on YouTube - see more here:

The interlocking is made in the same color as the background color - but if you want to have structure and be able to see the interlocking (check), then make the interlocking in a contrasting colour. If you want to see how this could turn out, I have a blue poncho on my website with neon green crochets (it makes the checkered pattern).

To finish the work, I have crocheted 2 rounds of double crochets around the edge. It gives stability and a nice finish to the edge around the bottom.

The neck edge is crocheted in single stitches. The first round is double crochet around the edge. After that, you have to go on each page of the middle stitch (front AND back) decrease a

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stitch. It gives a point in the neck both front and back and the neckline will sit nicely.
